FROM THE PASTOR'S STUDY

I checked the weather for March 1st. Will it come in like a lamb or a lion? So far the weather prediction is 29 degrees, partly cloudy with mild wind. Sounds lamby to me. Does that mean 3/31 will be wild? We shall see.



Just like weather predictions, our life path does not always follow a prescribed course, nor a sure and steady pace. We get those nor'easters, polar vortex, El Niño and La Niña, flash floods and sweltering sun. And like our life journey, the weather is out of our control, out of our hands. We can listen to weather reports, make plans, and hope for the best, but we are ultimately at the mercy of Nature. In our own lives, we can read the Word of God, attend worship, make plans and hope (and pray) for the best, but ultimately God is in control. Does that make us feel better or worse? Knowing an all-knowing and all-seeing Being is in control of things, can be satisfying to some. Others would like to be in control, even without having the power of omniscience or omnipotence.

What did Jesus say? He mentioned in the Gospel of Matthew that the people could interpret the weather signs - if the evening sky is red, fair weather tomorrow. In the morning, a red sky means bad weather on the way. As a child I heard the saying, "Red sky at night, sailor's delight; red sky in morning, sailor take warning." We CAN interpret the visible signs in the sky and on meteorology maps. But Jesus warned, "You cannot interpret the signs of the times. A wicked and adulterous (unfaithful) generation looks for a "sign" but none will be given..."

We need to pay attention to what God reveals to us through our prayer, worship, meditation and listening to Spirit. It is precisely because we have no control over most things, that our trust should be placed in the One who holds the stars in hand. We readily trust the meteorologist on the nightly news or online. They say rain, we take an umbrella. If they say bitter cold, we bundle up. If they say a winter snowstorm is coming, we run to the store to buy milk, bread and eggs (because blizzards evidently mean French toast for Mainers?) Yet how often are the predictions wrong? Or not as severe as predicted? Or MORE severe than predicted? Yet, we continue to watch (and overwatch) weather reports. We like to FEEL prepared. We like to THINK we know everything that is coming. Be not deceived, my friends. We do NOT.



By surrendering our spirit, our will, ourselves to God and trusting, believing and having faith that all will be well (even if it isn't now), we can live lives that are more free, more relaxed and more in tune with Spirit -like Jesus lived. "Therefore, I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?" Matt. 6:25-26



Plentiful Gifts Program

I am very excited to accept a new position with a new NACCC program. Rev. Irv. Gammon, Rockland Congregational Church, called me in December and told me about a collaboration with the NACCC, Dubuque Theological Seminary and a grant from the Lily Foundation. The program is explained below. He asked if I would be their Mentor, this is quite the honor and also pushing me out of my comfort zone. I feel I am being led by God to do this. We had our first retreat in Connecticut to meet the rest of the churches involved and the mentors, also to have the program explained and some work sessions, I learned so much and will be bringing some of this to our Church. Please keep me in your prayers as I move into an area I have never been before.

"Plentiful Gifts" is a grant-funded partnership between the NACCC and the University of Dubuque Theological Seminary. It aims to help small congregations with part-time clergy develop new ministry models and nurture the gifts and talents of lay people. Participating churches will work with the Plentiful Gifts team to explore their identity, community, challenges, and ministry gifts. A small group within each congregation will then receive training and support in areas such as preaching, worship, pastoral care, faith formation, community engagement, and leadership. Each church will have a mentor, and participants will support each other through prayer and biannual gatherings for worship, fellowship, and encouragement. The program requires a two-year commitment, starting with a sixmonth study phase followed by up to 18 months of tailored learning. Thanks to a grant from the Lily Foundation's "Thriving Congregations Initiative," there is no cost for churches to participate.

The 2025-2026 NACCC participating churches are:

- First Congregational Church, Rockland, Maine
- Congregational Church of Bound Brook, New Jersey
- Oakwood Heights Community Church, Staten Island, New York
- Congregational Church of the Valley, Chandler, Arizona



Plentiful Gifts proposes to identify and work with churches who desire to grow in faith and mission. Plentiful Gifts desires to nourish existing members within those churches to equip them to lead toward this growth instead of relying on full-time paid clergy. Four to six congregations within the NACCC will be enrolled to participate. The Mentor will provide guidance and coaching for a congregation in the Plentiful Gifts initiative in partnership with the NACCC Catalyst, shepherding participant congregations and members, and faithfully applying the grant provisions in ways that meet the particular and contextual needs of the congregations they will mentor.


Missions


